FORT VALLEY CLINICS

This year, the Fort Valley ride is offering two free clinics: one to teach riders about saddle fit and another to help riders improve their skills. The ABC's of Saddle Fitting Clinic will be presented by Jackie Fenaroli, President of Stonewall Saddle Company, on Thursday, October 18 from 11am-3pm. The clinic will provide you with the tools to improve your horse's comfort, as well as your security as a rider. You will see, in real time color, what is really going on under the saddle.

Jackie will also offer private one hour fitting appointments Friday and Saturday. Cost will be \$250 with pressure mapping of up to two saddles or \$125 without mapping. Payment is by cash or check. If you buy a saddle, cost of the private fitting will be deducted from the price.

Diane Sept, a "connected riding" instructor, will offer free "riding posture balance" instruction in your own saddle. Among other things, she will teach riders rotation in the saddle, which she says leads to less fatigue of both horse and rider.

Diane will be available Thursday afternoon around the time and place of Jackie's saddle fitting clinic, and Friday morning. You don't have to sign up in advance – just show up and she'll be there to help you.

RAFFLE HORSE

Tamburitza is the 20th horse Tom and Halldis Sayvetz of Asgard Arabians have donated to the ODEEO to help us raise the money needed to put on our rides. She will be exactly 3 years and 5 months old when raffled at the Fort Valley Ride. Tom says "she is a strong, sturdy filly with excellent bone, standing 15.1 now. She is by Stratagem x Tamborin by Bandjo de Falgas, so a full sibling in blood (dams are sisters) to last year's raffle horse Towards. Her temperament is phenomenal for an Arabian: not only is she sweet and cooperative, she's also remarkably calm and unexcitable. She proved this in June at the ODEEO Ride, which she attended for "camping" experience. When walked around the busy grounds packed with trailers, horses and pickup traffic, she was flatfooted and unreactive. She should mature into a fine endurance horse, and a fabulous family horse and friend for anybody."

DRAG RIDERS

The Old Dominion endurance rides cover some of the most beautiful and technical trails in the endurance riding world. It takes a large team of people to prepare the trails and to put on the events. Drag riders are a key part of that team.

The same factors that make the trails so scenic - the mountains and valleys, often far from roads - mean that we also need to provide riders who follow the last competitor. Their primary purpose is safety, to call for help if it is needed. Since there is little or no cell phone coverage on many parts of the trails, the drag riders carry radios to stay in touch with ride management. Even those radios can be limited in the mountains, so the drag riders can also communicate with another part of the team, the ham radio operators whose gear provide communications over the entire region.

Finally, the drag riders can ride out to get help. They deploy in teams of two per loop, so one can go get help while the other stays on the scene. So when you see them in their bright yellow vests, thank them for providing riders the peace of mind of knowing that help is on the scene or only a call away.
