Riders Offer June Ride Feedback

he Old Dominion 25 mile limited distance ride and 55 and 100 mile endurance rides were all held on Saturday, June 14, based at the Old Dominion Endurance Rides' new location in Orkney Springs, Virginia.

A total of 143 riders started: 38 in the 25, 78 in the 55 and 27 in the 100. Amazingly, more than 70% finished the 25 and 55 mile rides; 63% finished the 100.

The weather, by and large, cooperated. It was sunny and warm, but afternoon thunderstorms soaked everyone and everything, bringing the temperature down and cooling horses and riders.

Feedback from the riders was generally very positive. Everyone seemed to like the new trails, and the vets and volunteers got kudos from almost everyone. Some examples:

"The trail was challenging and beautiful." "The volunteers were great. Very helpful and very

friendly...The ride was a great experience." "Management is always ready to help."

"Overall, the ride was very organized...the trail was very well marked and beautiful."

"Great ride. New location very nice...The trails were very nice....Parking very organized."

"New trails beautiful. Appreciate less rocks!" "I think you all did a great job. Great new trails....

"Well staffed - volunteers, vets, farriers."

"Gus's bridge (nice touch!)"

"I liked the exit check...particularly in hot weather."

"The trail was challenging but not dangerous."

"Gate and go stops were well managed."

"Camp was well-organized." "Great trail. A true championship challenge."

Under the "what I liked most" category:

"Trail. Ride site." "(Ride secretary) John Marsh – so helpful." "Gorgeous trails. Technically difficult. Thank you!" "Love the color trail map – was very helpful. Nice camping field. OD! Gorgeous, difficult trail." "Great trails! Great vets! Great volunteers! Great meals!...." "Trail was great! Thank you for all your hard work."

There were some problems with trail markings, and several people suggested putting water tanks

out on the 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ mile climb up Devil's Hole Gap that the 55s and 100s tackled after the first vet check at Rogers Field.

We will address (and fix!) both issues next year. A few people complained about the very early cutoff for the discount entry fee; the board of directors has discussed this policy, and again, this is something we will change for 2009.

Several riders requested that we serve meals and have ride briefings at basecamp. Unfortunately, this is logistically difficult: renting a tent large enough to hold everyone would be prohibitively expensive and Shrine Mont, our caterer, needs to

serve somewhere near their main kitchen.

One person suggested not putting parking spaces right beside the manure piles and portapotties. Good idea!

We all agree the Pump Station vet

check used as the last hold for each distance had nowhere near enough room for trucks, horses (which shared a narrow road with vehicles) vets, pulse takers, timers, trot outs, etc. The whole situation was made worse by the fire truck arriving to refill the water tanks just as the largest number of horses were in – and that happened twice – once for the 25s and once when a large group of 55s were in!

However, our intrepid trail master, Gus Politis, has found a way to resolve this problem and has already arranged for us to use a large field instead of the Pump Station as a vet check next year.

Of course we love the kudos, but we also appreciate the constructive criticism, because without it, we wouldn't know where there were problems, and we'd repeat mistakes.

OD MEMBER PROFILE: Mary Howell

When/how did you get involved with the Old Dominion Endurance Rides? I attended an OD training event many years ago, in March 1999 at Hickory Lane (south end of Fort Valley), and remember riding behind Lani Newcomb as we zipped and zig-zagged around knee-knocker trees thinking "this is it!" Shiloh and I tackled our first 50 at NO Frills the following month and have taken part in OD rides every year since. When I was unable to compete, I helped out as a volunteer and discovered how many more people I could get to know on the ground than from the back of a horse!

What is your current role with OD? I joined the board last summer to help in making our move to the new location a success. I previously served on the board of directors of two other organizations and had a good idea of the time commitment this would require.

What do you do for a living? I have a Masters in Mass Communications/Journalism and serve as executive director for several trade groups, representing their concerns at the state and federal level as a registered lobbyist, organizing meetings and developing marketing initiatives. Non-profit salaries are not the highest, so I make extra money doing part-time interior house painting, which I really enjoy.

Do you own horses? I bought Shiloh as my first horse in 1995, when he was barely 3. He's made this sport easy and fun for me for many years, and is nearing 5000 AERC miles and well-earned retirement. My other horse, a playful half Saddlebred "Frankie" who is full brother to Dana Reeder's horse Charlie Brown, needs to finish filling out before he tackles a 50 - especially on OD trails!

Where do you live? I have 6 acres in New Kent County about 20 mile northeast of Richmond with lots of trails close by. What do you like to do when you're not riding? My husband and I live near the Pamunkey River and enjoy boating.

Fort Valley Rides to be Held Oct. 24–25

s manager of the October OD ride, I wanted to let you know that this year there will be some changes with the Fort Valley Ride, the third and last leg of the Old Dominion's "Triple Crown".

We will be setting base camp at Fitchett's Field, which is primitive with no permanent buildings or corrals. Fort Valley Stables were sold, I understand, earlier this year, but that's not why we're using a different basecamp. We are trying out some different trails to provide variety for those of you who do this ride every year, and we're always looking for ways to make the trail more enjoyable.

One of the reasons that I enjoy managing this ride is because it is truly the most beautiful ride that I go to, with fall foliage at its peak. If you've never done the ride before, do come -- and definitely bring your camera!

Another change is that we plan to do a central vet check, with all loops going out from Fitchett's. We reserve the right to change this, if last minute conditions dictate, but this should make things easier for those of you without pitcrew, and those of you with crew won't burn up so much expensive fuel driving from vet check to vet check.

Also different is that the ride will be Friday and Saturday, October 24th and 25th. In years past, we've done it on Saturday and Sunday, but that leaves us scrambling to get home and loading tired horses in the trailer on Sunday night.

We will be picking the winner of the 2008 Asgard Raffle Horse on Saturday night, so plan to stick around and be a part of the festivities. This year it's the lovely filly, Symetrie, three years old, and with Banjo as her Daddy, and Statistic as her Granddaddy, she's got it all.

The Fort Valley entry form has been posted on the OD website, www.olddominionrides.org, so be sure to sent in your entry before the early-entry discount ends! •

Trail Access Depends on YOU

Any changes at the federal level could result following the November elections, so this is an important year to take contact your U.S. senator and congressman to explain why access to national forests such as George Washington National Forest is important to you -- and vital to the preservation of our sport. The internet makes this simple; go to www.house.gov and www.senate.gov, enter your zip code and click on the contact option to send an e-mail.

In your own words, explain how being able to enjoy our country's natural resources on horseback fosters awareness of the importance of preserving them and contirbutes to conservation goals. For example, those who have received chainsaw training to legally operate this equipment not only help keep trails clear and open, but during a forest fire, their work can help wildland fighters get where they need to go to prevent the spread of fire. The American Endurance Ride Conference Trails Committee, online at www.aerc.org, can also assist with specifics on where and how to focus your efforts.

hose preparing for the Fort Valley Rides or just wanting to enjoy fall foliage are invited to the American Beauty 25-mile ECTRA-sanctioned competitive trail ride on Sunday, October 5.

Basecamp will be at Curtis Field, 2325 Boyer Road, Fort Valley, VA 22652-2035. Terrain is rolling country through woods and fields with gravel roads, so foot protection is required for your horse.

All entries must vet in by Saturday at 5pm. Saturday night dinner and Sunday breakfast will be provided, along with on-trail beverages and snacks, and Saturday lunch.

In addition to completion awards for all riders finishing the course in the prescribed time and on completion of final vetting, other awards include Grand and Reserve Champion, Top Junior, Best Arabian, Best Half Arabian, Best Morgan Best Appaloosa, and Best Grade Horse if entries warrant.

n late August, four Virginia residents were included in the 10 riders named to be in final contention to represent the United States at World Endurance Championships in Malaysia on November 8.

In addition to previous international endurance competitors John Crandell of Star Tannery, VA, Valerie Kanavy of Fort Valley, VA and Heather Reynolds (now residing at CreRun Farm in Doswell, VA), Lisa Green of Star Tannery was also named based on her mare's performance at FEI and other demonstration rides



earlier this year.

All of these riders have successfully competed at Old Dominion Rides over the years, showing that if you can survive Virginia's challenging trails, you can
